

Mahoney Demands Fiscal Responsibility

Congressman Backs Budget Resolution

(March 14, 2008)

(Washington, D.C.) - Congressman Tim Mahoney (FL-16) spoke on the floor of the House of Representatives Wednesday in support of the Fiscal Year 2009 Budget. The budget resolution eliminates the deficit by 2012, showing a better bottom line than the President's proposed budget.

The House budget invests \$6.1 billion in funding for renewable energy and energy efficiency initiatives, which is \$1.1 billion more than the 2008 level. The House budget also provides \$7.1 billion in additional funding for education. Most importantly, the House budget conforms to Pay-As-You-Go (PAYGO) Rule, which ensures that any new additional entitlement spending is offset so as not to increase the federal deficit.

The budget resolution:

- Does not raise taxes and protects middle class families from tax increases;
- Supports funding for national defense;
- Increases \$3.6 billion Veterans Health Care by \$3.6 billion;
- Expands children's healthcare by increasing funding for the SCHIP program by \$50 billion and
- Increases education spending by \$3.8 billion over the prior year and \$7.1 billion above the Presidents budget.

Floor Statement - H.Con Res 312 - Fiscal Year 2009 House Budget Resolution

I would like to thank my good friend from Florida for recognizing me.

Mr. Speaker, I rise today to enter into this colloquy with Mr. Boyd to express my support for the House Budget Resolution for Fiscal Year 2009.

A budget is a reflection of our priorities. For far too long, the Administration's priorities have been misplaced. In fact, the budget submitted by the President earlier this year makes cuts to Medicaid, Medicare, and the environment. In addition, it taxes our veterans by requiring them to pay new fees for health care. As a result of this Administration's misplaced priorities, the 5.6 trillion projected 10 year surplus that they inherited has been squandered. As a result, our children and grandchildren are confronted with the challenge of paying of a \$3.2 trillion deficit.

This budget before us today, however, is a good budget for Florida and the nation. The House budget protects our homeland by rejecting the President's cuts to first responder programs, reinstates funding for the COPS program and will put 247 more cops on Florida streets.

This budget helps Florida kids. It provides substantially more money for schools and education than the President's budget. It will allow our schools to hire the highly skilled teachers that over 25,000 Florida kids desperately need to help them compete in a global economy.

It rejects the President's irresponsible new fees that he wants to put on the backs of our veterans. It increases health care funding and allows the Veterans' Administration to treat 5.8 million more patients, including 333,275 Iraq and Afghanistan war vets.

I support this budget because it is fiscally responsible. It balances the budget by 2012 and adheres to all PAYGO rules.

Finally, I support this budget because it protects the most vulnerable among us - our nation's seniors. Specifically, the budget resolution improves supportive housing for the elderly. I would like to thank Chairman Spratt and his staff for working with me to ensure the Section 202 Housing for the Elderly program is adequately funded. In closing, I would urge my colleagues to support this resolution so that we can begin restoring America's real priorities.

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
